


Garden News

From the Schoolmistress

ctober! The harvest season is upon us. My favourite time of the year! We can now see the results of our spring planting and summer tending.

At the Schoolhouse, throughout the summer we look at the vegetable garden anticipating what will be ready when the students arrive. Will the squash and pumpkins be ripe? Will there still be tomatoes on the vine? What will the potato harvest be like? Planting a garden is really about planning for the future and, like any long-term plan, there's a degree of uncertainty. Weather, animals and the human element can all wreak havoc on best laid plans. The garden this summer was challenging. Between chipmunks eating our corn plants, hot, dry weather and almost torrential rain, weeds



and a lack of as much time as we would have liked to tend crops it's not exactly what we'd hoped and planned for in the spring. Thankfully this year we had some wonderful volunteers step forward to help us water and weed. So... there have been vegetables for the students to enjoy this fall and for us to enter in the Brampton Fair. And yes, we did win some ribbons! Now that school is back in, we're having fun in the garden with the students. Several groups



have been in for a Soils and Plants program. They've been harvesting and just love getting their hands and knees "soiled". Many have never been in a garden or been permitted to get "dirty". As we are now well into another school year we are already planning the garden for the spring and ultimately next fall. We will plant garlic and grain in another few weeks. Lisa is vowing to grow a giant pumpkin next year and I am determined to have a fantastic Three Sisters garden and try to outsmart the chipmunks so we'll actually have a corn crop. And like anticipating what will grow in our garden, we always consider how the experiences the students have at the Schoolhouse will help them to grow. How can what we do at a 19th century Schoolhouse open the door for inquiry and reflection?

This unique setting acts as a spring board for learning about life in the past, understanding how history shaped the present, which in turn helps to inform and shape the future. Just like a garden.

Early Curriculum Requirement

As we begin to adjust to the legalization of cannabis, it is interesting to look back at an era when alcohol was viewed unfavourably by some. Temperance groups advocated for complete abstinence and were successful in having temperance taught as a subject to students of all ages during the Prohibition period from the 1880s to the 1920s. Students were taught the "injurious effect of alcoholic stimulants" with the hope of preventing "the formation of habits so destructive to the happiness of the home and the prosperity of the individual and the community".

Students were required to pass a temperance examination before they could enter high school or obtain a teaching certificate.

Echoes of the Past The Rural One Room Schools of Peel County

This book documents the history of all the one room schools that existed in Peel. It covers the period from the early 1800's until the mid-1960's. There are old photos of most of the schools and photos of what the sites look like today. Timelines trace the history of the schools and an interesting – sometimes humorous – "historical gem" is included for each one.

This book is a great gift for a teacher or anyone interested in the history of education.

News From A Former Schoolmaster

Dennis Patterson was one of our schoolmasters. In the Summer/Fall newsletter we reprinted two of his articles about the gardens he helped create. Recently Dennis sent an email from his current home in Japan. He's still gardening but in a very different climate. Here is his email.

"Thanks for the reprint in the newsletter, 10 years goes by in a flash. I am still gardening away but now on the sub-tropical cycle. A big typhoon (the eye went over the island which is quite rare) just dashed our hopes of a dragonfruit harvest but the bananas are tough and

seem to have survived even though there are very few leaves remaining.

Once typhoon season is done we will plant potatoes, onions and carrots in the hopes of a big curry party at the end of March.

We have an active composting program and have 10 horses

on the property so fertiliser is never an issue. My pictures are mostly on my school computer if I remember I will send a few along."

If we receive any photos from Dennis we will pass them along.

Recipe Corner

As we approach the end of a beautiful harvest season there are wonderful ways to preserve your veggies. Why not consider roasting your peppers and garlic?

Prepare a roasting pan with foil. Place your whole, washed peppers on the foil and generously drizzle with a vegetable oil (grapeseed works well). Roast at 425 degrees F for approximately 25 minutes. Check them halfway through the cook time and turn them over when you see the skins charring. When they are completely charred, remove from pan and place in glass bowl covered with plastic wrap. After approximately 20 minutes remove the peppers to a cutting board and peel the skins and remove the core and seeds. The peppers are then ready to use. They are wonderful in a roasted veggie sandwich or can be pureed for a lovely soup base or pasta sauce!



If you haven't roasted garlic before, you really must try this. Take an entire bulb of garlic and cut about half an inch off the top and discard. Place the remaining garlic bulb (unpeeled) in a foil pocket and drizzle with a bit of oil. Bunch the top of the foil pocket to seal it. Place in a pre-heated 375 degree F oven and roast until soft (30-40 minutes). Remove from oven and allow to cool. Open foil pocket and remove garlic bulb. Squeeze the bulb over a small bowl to remove the garlic and discard the remainder of the bulb. It will be soft and spreadable. Use in pasta sauce, as a spread for garlic toast or add to mayonnaise to make a fantastic garlic aioli (for a burger or roasted veggie sandwich)!
