On September 11, Friends invited the local district of the Retired Teachers of Ontario to have their A.M. Special at the Schoolhouse. When people arrived, they were intrigued by the artifacts. They learned about the history of the Schoolhouse, and how Friends of the Schoolhouse supported the program in the past and now are watching

out for the Schoolhouse.



Dennis Taylor explained how many of the maps and charts had been preserved, not restored. He challenged the visitors with some math questions, which gave them a chance to use the slates. Only one person used her phone to figure out the answer!

Shirley Hoad spoke about how some members had researched one-room schoolhouses in Peel, some of which still exist. This led to publishing the book "Echoes of the Past."

One of our visitors shared her experience of bringing her

class when Jim Potter was the Schoolmaster. She had a picture of the event. Another visitor recalled how her son had been in the first class to visit the Schoolhouse when it reopened. She showed us the hand forged nail each student was given as a memento.

Since "the class" had worked hard at the math, they were given a chance to play with the toys. Thanks to Joanne Jennings for sharing her pictures.

Three visitors took out memberships. We also sold four of "Ben's books" and one "Echoes of the Past." Our visitors enjoyed the experience and Friends benefited from their presence.









## **Remembrance Day in Canada**


In April 1919 after the end of the First World War, a motion was introduced in Parliament to hold an annual November Armistice Day on the second Monday of November. King George V of England urged that the armistice be marked by two minutes of silence at exactly 11:00 a.m. on November 11 – the same day and time the armistice had been signed in 1918. Our Canadian Parliament adopted a resolution to change the name to Remembrance Day in 1931. This placed the emphasis upon the soldiers whose deaths were being remembered.

Remembrance Day is held across Canada. We honour those who served in wartime and remember those who died in military service. In Newfoundland and Labrador, Memorial Day is observed on July 1. Both Memorial Day and Remembrance Day are celebrated. Wreaths are laid at war memorials and assemblies are held in schools.

Millions of Canadians wear poppies leading up to Remembrance Day. Poppies are a symbol of remembrance thanks to the famous poem "In Flanders Fields" by Canadian poet John McCrea. The red poppy grows in the battlefields in Flanders (Belgium) and Northern France.

Canada's most prominent war memorial is the National War Memorial in Ottawa. It is traditionally attended by the Governor General, Prime Minister, Legion officials and a parade of veterans. Canada also has a Silver Cross Mother who represents the mothers of sons or daughters killed in service. The tomb of the Unknown Soldier is located in front of the National War Memorial. His remains were exhumed from a cemetery in Vimy and repatriated in 2000. After Remembrance Day in 2006, a woman placed a poppy on a makeshift memorial to recognize Canadian soldiers killed in Afghanistan. The tradition continues to this day.

#### We Remember



We have a plaque listing members of Britannia and the surrounding area who participated in the world wars. We honour them and all the others who fought for freedom at our November Open House.

Most of us are familiar with the poem, *In Flanders Fields* by John McCrae. One day on the battlefield he looked out upon hundreds of poppies and was inspired by their beauty in the midst of the war's devastation to write the poem. Poppies no longer naturally bloom there though some areas are planted near cemeteries. Those poppy seeds had long been buried deep in the earth. The tumult of war tearing up the ground brought them to the surface and they eventually bloomed. Today the land is mainly agricultural and is not dug deep enough to bring any poppy seeds to the surface. The poppies of Flanders were a once in a lifetime display of beauty amid the horrors of war.

more snow when we were children? Perhaps we did.




