A Tribute to Stalwart Friends

From time to time the Friends of the Schoolhouse recognizes those members who have made significant contributions over a long period of time. A sundial is dedicated to Eva Ardiel and the Teachers' Arbour honours all the former teachers of S.S. #12. In June we dedicated an arbour bench to Joan Reid and the split rail fence to Ben and Marjorie Madill. All three have been long time advocates for the Old Britannia Schoolhouse and its program and have worked tirelessly to preserve the schoolhouse for future generations.

Ben attended S.S. #12 in the 1920's. He and his wife Marjorie lived and farmed in the Britannia community until moving to Fergus several years ago. His firsthand knowledge of local history is invaluable. Both Ben and



Marjorie have been members of the Friends of the Schoolhouse committee since its formation. Even though they no longer live nearby, Ben and Marjorie continue to attend events when they can and contribute in many ways to the Friends of the Schoolhouse.



Joan Reid joined the Friends committee on her retirement from teaching. Her history teaching background and love of gardening were invaluable. Joan researched and published historical information about the one room schoolhouses in Peel. She also worked tirelessly to find proof of the correct date for the building of S.S. #12 which is in dispute. All of her detailed research points to 1852 as being the correct date. Joan's love of Hallowe'en led to one of our most successful events of the past few years - an evening of family "spooky" fun. The gardens surrounding the schoolhouse are entirely Joan's creation. Over the past 10 years she spent hours designing, documenting, and caring for these gardens. We were sad to learn that Joan passed away on August 6 after a short battle with lung cancer. She will be greatly missed.

We are pleased to recognize the contributions of Ben, Marjorie and Joan. When you visit the schoolhouse be sure to take a minute or two to sit in the arbour and to enjoy the roses growing on the split rail fence.

Sadly, Joan Reid, who was a Past Chair and Executive Director until recently, passed away in early August. It was Joan's initiative that established our marvelous flower gardens. The garden committee will now carry on with her work. It is partly because of the gardens that the schoolhouse is becoming an increasingly popular venue for wedding photos. Joan also published several volumes of research on the early schools in Peel County. We were in the process of recognizing her work with an arbour bench near her gardens and a plaque commemorating her contributions to the schoolhouse. Although Joan was not well enough to see the arbour bench and plaque in person, she did see photos of them. Joan's legacy will live on.

From the Schoolmistress

Christine Chapel

As we prepare for the beginning of another school year, I find myself reflecting on how things have changed over time.

Today, students look forward to September – a new grade, new teacher, new classroom or school, perhaps a new outfit or two and school supplies. Students of the past headed back to their one room school in mid August after a very brief break. Schools were generally open for eleven and a half months of the year. They were learning in a room with children from grade one to grade eight taught by one teacher. They would walk (or ride their horse, maybe) to school, several kilometres in some cases, a far cry from the car or bus ride that many students enjoy today. The same outfit was worn to school from day to day. They probably had another set of clothes for chores and a third for Sunday best.

Lunch (or dinner) was a simple affair. Everything brought for dinner in their pail or basket was a product of the family farm. Fresh or preserved produce, meat, eggs, cheese, and baked goods were common fare. Prepackaged, store bought food, Pizza lunches and breakfast programs were unheard of.

Today there are mandated limits on the number of students in a class. In the one room school of old there were no such limits. One of the artifacts on display at Britannia Schoolhouse is a school register from 1885 listing 62 students on the classroom roster! Of course, rarely would all of the students be present on any one day. It was not until 1871 that school became compulsory for all children aged 7 to 12 years but only for 4 months of the year. Being from a farming community, children were expected to help their families with the farm work. During harvest or planting time in particular, many children (especially boys) were kept out of school. This was accepted practice.

Modern day students have a great variety of media from which to learn and help them in their studies. Books, laptops, iPods, television, videos – modern means and methods are used at every turn. Students of long ago learned by rote, from books, if they were lucky enough to have them, and woe to the student who misbehaved or did not complete their work to the teacher's satisfaction. Students failed and were disciplined harshly, both unacceptable practices in modern times. The strap and sundry other humiliating punishments were meted out as a teacher saw fit.

Yes, times have changed, but in the past schools played just as important a role in the community as they do today, perhaps more so. I think that long ago, like today, most students would have looked forward to the beginning of school with anticipation and did enjoy their time in the one room Schoolhouse.



Past Events The Annual Planning Meeting

Each July the committee meets to review our year's activities and to plan for the year ahead. We consider our successes and those areas which need improvement. Queen Victoria's Journals

When she was 13 years old, Princess Victoria's mother gave her a journal so she could write about a visit to Wales. From then and throughout her 63 year reign, Queen Victoria faithfully wrote in her journal, documenting important events and family life. Her last entry is 10 days before her death. There are several references to Canada in her journals. In an 1838 entry she writes about asking Lord Melbourne "were any English living in Canada when we took it?" To which Lord Melbourne replied, 'I believe none."
